- A growing number of young people are experiencing mental health challenges, with statistics showing increases in anxiety, depression, and suicidal behaviors. New York State's efforts to address this crisis include the expansion of school-based mental health clinics, passing the Stop Addictive Feeds Exploitation (SAFE) for Kids Act (A.8148-A of 2024), proposing bell-to-bell cell phone use restrictions during the school-day, expanding peer-to-peer mental wellness programs, and proposing universal free breakfast and lunch in schools. Do you think New York State needs to continue prioritizing the issue of youth mental health?

- The Governor is proposing direct assistance for first-time homebuyers in an effort to address New York's housing crisis and help young people purchase homes in the communities they grew up in. There is also discussion about preventing institutional investors from purchasing homes within 75 or more days of being listed for sale. Do you support this proposal?

- The NY Health Act would create a universal single-payer health plan for all New Yorkers, regardless of age or health condition (A.1466). It would provide healthcare, prescription coverage, dental, and vision care with no premiums, no copays, deductibles, or other out-of-pocket expenses; instead, it would be paid for by a payroll tax on all employees in the state, with studies suggesting that 90% of New Yorkers would pay less annually for their health care. Do you support this legislation proposing a universal single-payer health plan for New York residents?

- Medical Aid in Dying, which allows terminally ill patients to end their life according to their own wishes, has been legalized in ten states. New York's proposed legislation makes medical aid in dying a legal option for terminally ill patients of sound mind with fewer than six months to live (A.136). Do you support this legislation?

- The extreme weather and resulting damage caused by climate change is costing New Yorkers billions of dollars each year. Last year, New York passed a Cap & Invest program that sets an annual state-wide cap on Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions that declines yearly to help meet the goal of a 40% GHG reduction by 2030. Polluters will be required to purchase allowances for the amount of GHG emissions they produce every year, and the funding from those purchases will offset the costs of the state's transition to greener alternatives. Do you support making polluters pay for their GHG emissions?

- The Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act (A.1749) would require companies to reduce unnecessary packaging, increase the use of recycled materials used for packaging, and fund municipal recycling programs. This act aims to shift the cost of waste management from taxpayers to large corporations. Do you support this legislation?

- It costs roughly \$70,000 a year to incarcerate someone in New York, a total cost of nearly \$3 billion annually. Right now, mandatory minimums limit judicial discretion, preventing reconsideration of sentences for those who have demonstrated growth and rehabilitation. The Second Look Act (A.1283) and Elder Parole (A.514) aim to address this issue by granting judges and parole boards the discretion to reconsider sentencing and parole eligibility for elderly individuals who have served lengthy sentences. - Doxing is the publishing of private information about a person with malicious intent. Local and state-wide instances of doxing have targeted individuals—often in the context of a personal or political conflicts—by sharing home addresses, phone numbers, and other personal information on social media, online forums and widespread mailers.
