Ramos fighting to increase the minimum wage


Assemblyman Phil Ramos joined community organizers, Make the Road New York and rallied alongside advocates for low-income Long Islanders in support of a measure that would allow cities and counties to supplement the state minimum wage.

Currently, Assemblyman Ramos is a prime sponsor of Assembly bill A.8343 which would raise the statutory minimum wage from \$8.00 to \$9.00 per hour on and after December 31, 2014, and provide that on each December 31 thereafter the rate shall be indexed to inflation. The bill recently passed the Assembly Labor and Ways and Means Committees and goes to the Assembly floor next for a vote.

"A higher minimum wage helps everyone, from workers to businesses," Assemblyman Ramos said. "Putting more money into the pockets of those most likely to spend it increases demand for products, and in turn, jobs. Statistics back up this claim. Ten states already index their minimum wage to inflation, and those states have reported positive economic results—high rates of growth in companies, job creation, and payroll. Higher, fairer wages also result in better worker productivity and less worker turnover."

Assemblyman Ramos has called on the State Department of Health to conduct an investigation into the possible risks associated with the illegally dumped hazardous materials. In addition, Assemblyman Ramos has contacted the state comptroller to investigate whether Day Tree or any related companies have any contracts with the state and to consider putting a hold on all funds until the investigation is over.

Assemblyman Ramos fought to pass a final state budget that makes life a little more affordable for working families.

Lowers families' cost of living

- <u>Provides property tax relief</u> in the form of rebate checks for homeowners and tax credits for renters
- <u>Cuts an energy tax</u> on your utility bill
- <u>Reduces New York's estate tax</u> to ensure your estate goes to loved ones, not the tax collector

Protects your health

- Expands eligibility for the Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Coverage (EPIC) program to help lower the cost of prescription medications
- <u>Protects you from surprise medical bills</u> if you are unknowingly treated by an out-of-network doctor
- <u>Ensures that you won't lose your life savings</u> if you have an ill spouse who needs long-term care




Lower your energy costs with REAP

PSEG Long Island's Residential Energy Affordability Partnership (REAP) program can help income-eligible customers save energy and lower their electric bills.

Eligible customers would have a REAP technician conduct a home survey. The technician may install energy-saving measures in your home at no cost to you. In addition, they will teach you how to use less energy and they will inspect your electric appliances, lighting, heating system, and other energy consuming equipment.
