I hope September is off to a healthy start for you and your family.

It is hard to believe that we just commemorated the 24th Anniversary of the September 11th attacks.

This devastating day hit our communities in Assembly District 21 especially hard. I am honored to attend the ceremonies throughout the district that pay tribute to the victims and offer my support to their families. Sadly, families are still losing loved ones to 9/11 related diseases. My heart goes out to all these families, victims and our heroic first responders. We will never forget.

I am sure most of you have heard about the potential LIRR strike. Well, for now the LIRR Strike has been averted since, yesterday, LIRR union leaders asked our President to convene a Presidential Emergency Board (PEB.) Under the Railway Labor Act, the establishment of a PEB by the president delays any potential strike for at least 60 days, but more likely until May 2026. This provides more time for negotiations between the five unions and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA)

Again, included below is information on the NYS Draft Energy Plan and the Propel NY Energy Transmission Project. The state is seeking your feedback, so I ask you to consider submitting a comment.




## **UBS Arena and Belmont Park Village Tour**

This measure will help in the affordability crisis on Long Island by providing employment at a fair wage for local workers, whether in a union or not. By using Project Labor Agreements for all contractors and subcontractors on state funded capital projects at school districts on Long Island, quality work can be done efficiently and affordably.
