



Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Happy Pride Month! New York has always been a haven for diversity and the fight for equality. As the lead sponsor of the New York State Equal Rights Amendment ratified by voters last November, we will always fight for the rights, acceptance, and dignity of LGBTQ+ New Yorkers. This Pride Month, we celebrate the LGBTQIA+ community and are more determined than ever to defend their hard-won rights from those who would otherwise turn back the clock.

I was proud to advocate for the HEAT Act with my colleagues in Albany to lower energy bills, implement cleaner heating, and end fracked gas expansion. This bill will deliver on reducing our carbon footprint, lowering household utility bills, and advancing affordability, key issues for older New Yorkers who may be on a fixed income.

At a City Hall press conference this week, we called for the passage of critically needed reforms to the rent freeze and homeowners' exemption programs in New York City. The legislation for which we are advocating will extend eligibility to more tenants and homeowners and make housing more affordable.

The City Primary Election is on Tuesday, June 24, in New York, and in-person Early Voting begins Saturday, June 14. Eligible voters can register to vote until June 14 to be eligible to vote in the Primary Election. You can check your voter registration status <u>here</u>. Seawright Spoke at City Hall Press Conference Calling for Reforms to the City's Rent Freeze and Homeowners Exemption Programs



Assembly Member Seawright spoke at a press conference to press for the passage of legislation to expand the eligibility of the city programs that keep housing costs affordable for older New Yorkers. AARP and the Center for an Urban Future studies revealed that more than a quarter million older adults in New York City are living in poverty, a forty percent surge over the last decade. Sixty percent of those over 70 do not have a stable source of retirement income. The current income threshold for the rent freeze is \$50,000. Accounting for inflation, today the threshold should be \$67,000. Programs like the rent freeze and homeowners' exemptions help our older New Yorkers to age in place with dignity and independence and desperately need to be updated to account for today's standards.

Spotlight on Aging: Aging: The Signs of Sepsis

Sepsis: 4 Signs



Temperature: high or low temperature.



Infection: sepsis happens because of infection, even from a small cut or scrape.



Mental change: confusion, mental decline, tiredness, or slurred speech.



Extreme pain or discomfort: illness, shortness of breath.





Sepsis is a **life- threatening condition**. It can
happen to **anyone**.

If you have any combination of these symptoms, get medical help and ask: "Could it be sepsis?"

Sepsis is the body's overwhelming and life-threatening response to infection, which can lead to tissue damage, organ failure, and death.

It takes a life every 90 seconds (350,000 adults each year in the U.S.), and over 80% of these deaths may be preventable.

It is crucial you get medical care right away if you have an infection that is not getting better or is getting worse.

According to Sepsis Alliance, a person with sepsis might have one or more signs or symptoms:

- Temperature: higher or lower than normal
- Infection: may have signs and symptoms of infection
- Mental decline: confused, sleepy, difficult to rouse
- Extremely ill: severe pain, discomfort, shortness of breath

Sepsis is a medical emergency that requires rapid diagnosis and treatment.

At GoodCauseNYC.org, a brand-new website, NYC tenants can enter their address and answer a short set of questions to determine if their apartment unit is eligible for protections, and access resources to fight back against an unjust rent hike or lease nonrenewal. The site also includes a rent increase calculator to help renters determine if their rent hike is considered "unreasonable" by the law.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) can cover the cost of fans and air conditioners for eligible New Yorkers. To find out if you qualify, visit: otda.ny.gov/programs/heap/#cooling-assistance.

Empire State Child Credit

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance is issuing supplemental Empire State Child Credit payments to over 1.5 million low- and moderate-income New Yorkers. The 2024–2025 New York State budget provides for an additional payment to eligible taxpayers based on the Empire State child credit. If you qualify for a payment, you don't need to do anything; we will automatically calculate and send you a check for the amount you're entitled to. Energy Affordability Programs

The NYS Energy Affordability Program provides income-eligible consumers with a discount on their monthly electric and/or gas bills. You may be enrolled automatically if you receive benefits from a government assistance program. Regular HEAP Benefit

The 2024-25 Regular HEAP benefit reopened January 25, 2025. Find out if you may be

Health Insurance

New Yorkers can enroll in a Qualified Health Plan by the 15th of the month for coverage starting the 1st of the following month and benefit from new cost-sharing reductions for additional savings. HIICAP

Approximately 500 trained HIICAP counselors located in local offices for the aging across the state are available to answer New Yorkers' questions about Medicare, Medicare Advantage programs (managed care), Medicare prescription drug coverage, Medigap, and other health and long-term care insurance. 
