It is unacceptable that across our city and state, Antisemitism is surging around us. In 2024 alone, New York City saw 345 Antisemitic hate crimes—more than half of all hate crimes in the city. Statewide, nearly half of all hate crimes target Jewish New Yorkers. Please join us this Tuesday at Lenox Hill Neighborhood House, 331 East 70 Street (1st/2nd Ave.) at 6pm for an important Community Town Hall for Action on Combating Antisemitism, featuring a distinguished panel of expert speakers.

In case you missed it, this past Sunday, I was interviewed by Cheryl Wills on NY1's IN FOCUS regarding the first State Master Plan for Aging. The master plan, developed in coordination with aging service stakeholders, will be a road map for policymakers to develop legislation and advocate for budget priorities.

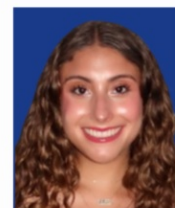

Manhattan State Assemblymember Rebecca Seawright talks about her experience as chair for the Committee on Aging as Gov. Kathy Hochul moves to make state history with a new plan.

At [GoodCauseNYC.org](https://www.GoodCauseNYC.org), a brand-new website, NYC tenants can enter their address and answer a short set of questions to determine if their apartment unit is eligible for protections and access resources to fight back against an unjust rent hike or lease nonrenewal. The site also includes a rent increase calculator to help renters determine if their rent hike is considered "unreasonable" by the law.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) can cover the cost of fans and air conditioners for eligible New Yorkers. To find out if you qualify, visit: otda.ny.gov/programs/heap/#cooling-assistance.

Cash Assistance Benefits Skimming Alert

New York's Paid Family Leave Program

Since first launching in 2018, New York State Paid Family Leave has provided critical benefits to improve the lives of tens of thousands of working New Yorkers and their families. Empire State Child Credit

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance is issuing supplemental Empire State Child Credit payments to over 1.5 million low- and moderate-income New Yorkers. The

2024–2025 New York State budget provides for an additional payment to eligible taxpayers based on the Empire State child credit. If you qualify for a payment, you don't need to do anything; DTF will automatically calculate and send you a check for the amount you're entitled to. Energy Affordability Programs

The NYS Energy Affordability Program provides income-eligible consumers with a discount on their monthly electric and/or gas bills. You may be enrolled automatically if you receive benefits from a government assistance program. Regular HEAP Benefit

The 2024-25 Regular HEAP benefit reopened January 25, 2025. Find out if you may be eligible to apply for programs and services. If you are eligible, you may receive one regular HEAP benefit per program year to help you pay for heating your home. Visit: otda.ny.gov/programs/heap/

Health Insurance

New Yorkers can enroll in a Qualified Health Plan by the 15th of the month for coverage starting the 1st of the following month and benefit from new cost-sharing reductions for additional savings. HIICAP

Approximately 500 trained HIICAP counselors located in local offices for the aging statewide are available to answer New Yorkers' questions about Medicare, Medicare Advantage programs (managed care), Medicare prescription drug coverage, Medigap, and other health and long-term care insurance. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits

New changes include providing a simplified one-page application form, allowing older New Yorkers to recertify their benefits for 36 months instead of 24 months, and eliminating the interview requirement for recertification. To learn more about SNAP and apply for benefits, [click here](#).

Farmers markets nationwide offer incentives to shoppers who use SNAP to purchase local food, yet it all started here in NYC over ten years ago. Health Bucks are \$2 coupons sponsored by the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene that can be used to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables at all NYC farmers markets. Spend \$2 in SNAP/EBT/Summer EBT, and receive a bonus \$2 Health Buck up to \$10 per visit! This incentive stretches a SNAP budget and encourages shoppers to spend more of their monthly food assistance allotment on fresh produce from the market. Spend \$2 in SNAP/EBT/Summer EBT, and get a bonus \$2 Health Buck up to \$10 per visit at all Greenmarket and Farmstand locations. Health Bucks are accepted at all Greenmarket and Farmstand locations for the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables. Congestion Pricing Discounts and Exemptions

Vehicles entering Manhattan streets at or below 60th St. will be tolled. Most E-ZPass users will pay \$9 during peak hours or \$2.25 overnight, once daily. Discounts and exemptions, such as the Low-Income Discount or Disability Exemption plans, are available—learn more at mta.info/discounts. The New York State Division of Human Rights announced the launch of a new call center allowing New Yorkers to file a discrimination report via phone with a call center agent for the first time in the Division's history by dialing (844) NYS-DHR1 or (844) 697-3471. The call center is staffed by trained professionals who will provide real-time interaction to callers and process discrimination reports on their behalf. This critical enhancement to the Division's complaint intake process will reduce paperwork for New Yorkers, increase access to live support, and make the agency's intake procedures more efficient.

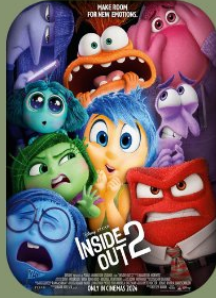
