On the Federal Level

U.S. National Archives and Records Administration, National Historical Publications and Records Grants

Funding is available for archival projects that will significantly improve online public discovery and use of historical records collections. Projects that engage the public, expand civic education and promote understanding of the nation's history, democracy and culture from the founding era to the present day are eligible. The commission encourages projects focused on collections of America's early legal records, such as the records of colonial, territorial, county and early statehood and tribal proceedings that document the evolution of the nation's legal history.

- **Eligible Applicants:** Native American tribal governments (federally recognized); county governments; public and state-controlled institutions of higher education; city or township governments; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; state governments

U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF), Small Business Innovation Research / Small Business Technology Transfer Fast-Track Pilot Programs

This funding supports moving scientific excellence and technological innovation from the lab to the market. By funding startups and small businesses, NSF helps build a strong national economy and stimulates the creation of novel products, services and solutions in private, public, or government sectors with potential for broad impact; strengthens the role of small business in meeting federal research and development needs; increases the commercial application of federally supported research results; and develops and increases the US workforce, especially by fostering and encouraging participation by socially and economically disadvantaged and women-owned small businesses.

U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Occupational Safety and Health Research Funding

This funding is for programs that develop an understanding of the risks and conditions associated with occupational diseases and injuries, explore methods for reducing risks and preventing or minimizing exposure to hazardous conditions in the workplace and translate significant scientific findings into prevention practices and products that will effectively reduce work-related illnesses and injuries.

■ **Eligible Applicants:** Special district governments; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized); state governments; small businesses; county governments; for profit organizations other than small businesses; Native American tribal organizations (other than federally recognized tribal governments); public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; city or township governments; private institutions of higher education; independent school districts; others (see text field entitled "Additional Information on Eligibility" for clarification); nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; public and state controlled institutions of higher education

U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF), Materials Research Science and Engineering Centers (MRSEC)

This funding provides sustained support of materials research and education of the highest quality while addressing fundamental problems in science and engineering. Each MRSEC addresses research of a scope and complexity requiring the scale, synergy and multidisciplinary approach provided by a campus-based research center. The MRSECs support materials research infrastructure in the United States, promote active collaboration between universities and other sectors, including industry and international organizations, and contribute to the development of a national network of university-based centers in materials research, education and facilities.

■ **Deadline:** November 24, 2025, 5 PM

- **Eligible Applicants:** Institutions of higher education (IHEs): two- and four-year IHEs (including community colleges) accredited in, and having a campus located in the US, acting on behalf of their faculty members. Special instructions for international branch campuses of US IHEs: if the proposal includes funding to be provided to an international branch campus of a US institution of higher education (including through use of sub-awards and consultant arrangements), the proposer must explain the benefit(s) to the project of performance at the international branch campus and justify why the project activities cannot be performed at the US campus

On the Private Level

Musicians Foundation, Grants for Essential Bills

Professional musicians in specific periods of need, crisis and transition can apply for a one-time grant through the comprehensive online application. Submitted applications are reviewed and a screening committee ensures that aid is provided as effectively as possible. If awarded a grant, a check is made out directly to the biller (hospitals, landlords, utility providers, etc.) and sent to the approved applicant. This process allows musicians to pay bills quickly and with dignity.



■ **Deadline:** Rolling

■ Eligible Applicants Must:

- be a professional music performer, composer/arranger, or educator in a specific time of need caused by an unexpected hardship (e.g., medical or dental situation, natural disaster, or certain housing crisis)
- have worked as a professional musician in the United States for five or more years and currently reside in the U.S.
- have filed taxes as a musician for five or more years and be able to provide a copy of a recently completed tax
 return
- Award Amounts: Vary, typically \$500 \$3,000

Glen W. Bailey (GWB) Foundation, STEM Initiatives Grants

Funding is available for organizations seeking programmatic funding pertaining to STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) education at all levels. Applications are invited for the following programs:

STEM Sprouts: An early education STEM program designed to introduce young children, typically between the ages of three and 10, to the foundational concepts and skills within these four fields. Such programs should aim to foster curiosity, critical thinking, problem-solving abilities and a love for STEM learning from an early age. Grants of up to \$25,000 will be awarded

STEM Stars: Organizations supporting middle and high school students participating or interested in advanced STEM programs and who want to pursue a college degree in a STEM-related field. Programming can take place before, during, or after school. The foundation encourages programs that are successfully preparing interested students who wish to be fully prepared for their intended college STEM major by exposing them to advanced topics in science, engineering, computer science and more. Grants of up to \$25,000 will be awarded

STEM Scholars: A post-secondary STEM program aimed at providing colleges and universities with more funding and flexibility for their internal STEM programs. The program seeks to offer opportunities to expand current programs or seed money to create new programs. Funding can support a multitude of activities and initiatives such as club activities, career management counselors, showcases, research projects, camps, tech talks, student clubs and organizations, lecture series and professor continuing-education programs. Grants of up to \$25,000 will be awarded

Teen Tech Competition: The foundation is interested in supporting large STEM-related organizations that are interested in creating or continuing a tech competition for local youth. Organizations would be required to operate under certain (but flexible) parameters and are encouraged to let the participating students lead the way in building out the actual competition's layout. Grants of up to \$50,000 will be awarded

American Council of Learned Societies, Digital Justice Seed Grants

This program is designed to promote and provide resources for projects at various stages of development that diversify the digital domain, advance justice and equity in digital scholarly practice and/or contribute to public understanding of racial and social justice issues. This program supports digital projects across the humanities and interpretative social sciences that critically engage with the interests and histories of people of color and other historically marginalized communities through the ethical use of digital tools and methods. In this way, the program seeks to address the inequities in the distribution of access to tools and support for digital work among scholars across various fields, those working with under-utilized or understudied source materials and those in institutions with less support for digital projects.

■ **Deadline:** November 20, 2025, 9 PM

■ Eligibility Requirements:

- at least one of the project's principal investigators (PIs) must be a scholar in the humanities and/or the interpretative social sciences
- projects must be within the start-up or prototyping phase of development
- projects must be made as widely available as intellectual property constraints allow, ideally with the most liberal open-source and Creative Commons license that is appropriate for the underlying content
- an institution of higher education in the United States must administer awarded grant funds
- **Award Amounts:** \$10,000-\$25,000

Foundation for Food & Agriculture Research (FFAR), Rapid Outcomes from Agricultural Research (ROAR) Grants

This program deploys urgent funding to support research and outreach in response to emerging or unanticipated threats to the nation's food supply or agricultural systems. According to FFAR, plant and animal pests and pathogens can strike quickly, devastating crops, livestock and livelihoods. To address these outbreaks quickly, the ROAR program funds rapid research related to response, prevention, or mitigation of new pests and pathogens. ROAR's one-year funding fills urgent research gaps until traditional, longer-term funding can be secured.

Scholar Awards

Jack Kent Cooke Foundation College Scholarship Program

 - submit standardized test score(s) from one of the following: SAT, ACT, AP, or IB exam. There is no minimum score requirement to apply, however, applicants must have taken one (or more) of these tests and submit the score
 - demonstrate unmet financial need applicants with a family adjusted gross income up to \$95,000 will be
 considered. During the selection process, the foundation will conduct a full financial review which will take into
 account all income and assets of the student and the student's parents
